Commentators

Peter Bryant - Commentator



Pete is a Co-Director of <u>Shared Future</u> and specialises in citizens' assemblies and juries, bringing 35 years' experience in the fields of participation and community development.

He uses a range of innovatory participatory approaches in his work and has also supported local authorities to introduce the use of <u>Participatory Budgeting</u>.

Pete has facilitated numerous climate change deliberative processes on behalf of Shared Future - face to face and online, including <u>Lancaster City Council</u>, <u>Kendal Town Council</u>, the <u>Leeds Climate Commission</u>, <u>Warwick District Council</u>, and <u>North of Tyne Combined Authority</u> and <u>Wandsworth Council</u> (Air Quality). He has also facilitated citizens' assemblies for Shared Future on diverse topics ranging from <u>alcohol</u>, <u>fracking</u> and <u>mental health</u> and produced a <u>guide to Climate Assemblies and Juries</u> on behalf of the Place-based Climate Action Network.

Claire Mellier - Commentator



Claire is a facilitator and researcher, co-initiator and organiser of the Global Citizens' Assembly, Iswe Foundation. Her core interest is to enable people to play an active and influential part in decisions which affect their lives. Her work is founded on three main capabilities: facilitation, systems change and impact evaluation. Claire was part of the facilitation team at Climate Assembly UK and one of the accredited researchers who observed France's Convention Citoyenne pour le Climat.

Over the last few years, she has facilitated several deliberative processes on climate change and other environmental topics, both at the local and national level. In 2020, in collaboration with other partners, she launched the <u>Global Assembly</u> for COP26. She is the author of a Carnegie Europe article entitled "<u>Getting Climate Citizens</u>" <u>Assemblies Right</u>". In March 2021, she contributed to the "Democracy on the edge" edition of the <u>New Internationalist</u>. She is currently Knowledge and Practice Lead with the <u>Iswe</u> Foundation

Professor Alan Renwick - Commentator



Alan is Professor of Democratic Politics and Deputy Director of the Constitution Unit at University College, London. He is an expert in the mechanisms through which citizens can participate in formal politics: particularly in electoral systems, referendums, and deliberative processes such as citizens' assemblies. He has convened a number of citizens' assemblies, including on Brexit and <u>Democracy in the UK</u>. He was also on the Advisory Group for the UK Climate assembly, as well as Street Voice citizens' jury in Oxford.

Liz is an Oxford-based independent Organisation Development practitioner, leadership team coach, mediator and facilitator, bringing over 35 years' experience of working across public services, international NGOs and social movements, in the UK and internationally. She also has a strong track record of running systems leadership development programmes for senior leaders and change agents in local authorities, NHS and public health and facilitating multi-stakeholder large group processes.

In the last few years, she has brought her facilitation and dialogue skills into the deliberative democracy space through facilitating and supporting a number of citizens' assemblies and citizens' juries at local, national and international level. These have ranged from democracy in the UK, addressing air quality, health and transport, improving social housing and town centres and tackling the climate and ecological crisis. In her work, she seeks to create the conditions for different conversations that support generative learning and wise action, in service of people and planet.

Dr Alison Chisholm - Co-Convenor



Dr Alison Chisholm is a researcher in the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences, a Research Associate at the Global Centre on Healthcare and Urbanisation (GCHU) and Research Member of Common Room, Kellogg College, at the University of Oxford.

She has a British Academy Innovation Fellowship <u>Citizens' Voices Making Change</u>, working in collaboration with Involve, to explore ways to enhance the impact and legacy of deliberative democratic processes to tackle the related challenges of the climate crisis and health inequalities. She was co-organiser of <u>Street Voice</u>, a citizens' jury on Transport and Health in Headington.

Dr Juliet Carpenter - Co-Convenor



Dr Juliet Carpenter is Director of Research at the Global Centre on Healthcare and Urbanisation (GCHU), and Senior Research Fellow at Kellogg College, University of Oxford. She works at the interface of debates in urban geography, planning, political science and urban sociology, with a particular interest in urban social sustainability and the method of Co-Creation. She was co-organiser of Street Voice, a citizens' jury on Transport and Health in Headington, held in the summer of 2022.
